Last Meeting Summary

Susie O'Donnell and Jennifer Pennington asked us to rethink our objectives for our yards. Most of our yards contain wide expanses of grass. We have various reasons for this: we think it looks good, we want the our neighbors to admire us, or local regulations may stipulate a lot of grass. Susie and Jennifer asked us to consider, instead, the health of the environment and especially the wellbeing of wildlife habitats. Susie is a member of aFewSteps.org and the Swarthmore Environmental Advisory Council. Jennifer is the President of the Swarthmore Horticultural Society.

They warned us that the insect and vertebrate populations in our area are in steep decline. They recommended we replace at least some of our grass lawns with native plants and shrubs to help restore wildlife. Native plants are a food source for native animals. Ryan Martin Jane Billings David Page for chemicals such as fertilizer, herbicides and pesticides, which are harmful to wildlife.

They had a number of suggestions on making our yards more ecofriendly. You can start small by planting a portion of your lawn with native plants and shrubs. Good locations are around the base of trees and places where grass doesn't grow. Leaving dead leaves on the ground helps the insect life cycle and the soil retain moisture. We should stop using lawn chemicals. We should mulch or compost instead of using fertilizer. We should reduce outdoor lighting. Jane Billings, the former Borough Manager, told us that Swarthmore Borough regulations may limit how far homeowners can go in converting to a natural yard. She cited the following regulations: "Noxious weeds shall be prohibited" (Section 302.4 of the 2018 International Property Maintenance Code). The Borough defines noxious weeds as "any neglected or uncared for vegetation, whether living or dead, including all unpruned, rank or uncut weeds, grass, vines, plants, shrubs, trees, brush or undergrowth" (Section 1481.04(a)). I suppose one person's native plant is another person's noxious weed. Susie and Jennifer noted that they will be conducting home eco-audits this summer. During the audit, they will identify invasive plants and recommend native alternatives. They will also make recommendations to help yards be more wildlife friendly. The audits will be announced in the Swarthmorean.
